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Rajant Corporation Bringing High-Tech Jobs to Rowan County

Rajant Corporation is an industrial wireless communications technology company that has brought high-tech jobs to Rowan County, setting our community apart with successful deployments in over 80 countries around the world in various industries such as military, mining, ports, rail, oil & gas, petrochemical plants, municipalities, agriculture, and more. Rajant's location in Rowan County is their main manufacturing center, as well as an office for sales engineering, and more of its radios are produced right here in our very own MMRC Industrial Park than anywhere else in the country.

Rajant's investment in our county demonstrates the great resources our region has to offer. After Representative Hal Rodgers pointed out to Rajant's leaders the extensive potential already available in our community from Morehead State University, they decided to establish an office location in Morehead. In the seven years since then, they have expanded to nearly 40 employees, and according to Jim Tom Trent, who works with Rajant in new business development, they plan to increase to 100 within the next five years. "It's great to see innovative companies growing and reinvesting in the commonwealth creating more good-paying jobs for Kentuckians," Governor Andy Beshear said at a past event with Rajant. "Our strong higher education system – with many specialized programs that prepare Kentuckians to work in key industries – helps attract new jobs and foster continued investment. It's imperative that we continue to attract and grow higher-skill, well-paying careers for Kentuckians while providing the means to educate and train for those positions."

Morehead State's engineering programs, particularly regarding space systems engineering and space science, was a major factor in their decision to locate here. They have hired over thirty MSU graduates and work with MSU on aerospace projects. MSU's Space Science Center has RF and electronics laboratories; anechoic chambers that mimic the electromagnetic environment of space; a rooftop antenna test range; and a space systems development laboratory. The Star Theater digital planetarium hosts educational and entertainment programming for the community. Additionally, MSU's students have the opportunity to work on Morehead State's 21-meter space tracking antenna. This makes them well-prepared to enter the Space Systems Engineering field, demonstrating how extensively prepared these graduates are and how Rajant has kept and will keep talent right here in Rowan County for years to come.

Rajant's technology is truly innovative and is designed to "make and never break". In 2001, Paul Hellhake and Robert Schena established Rajant Corporation together in the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks when our country witnessed communication breakdowns when traditional networks were overwhelmed and hit by terrorists. One of the great things about Rajant's wireless communications technology is that every node in a network can act independently of one another so there is no one single point of failure. Every node, called a BreadCrumb®, in Rajant's Kinetic Mesh® networks can act independently and with full routing capabilities, making it a true peer-to-peer network that is completely mobile-enabled and supports AES-CCMP and TKIP encryption. Kinetic Mesh® networks work autonomously to provide this kind of connectivity across dynamic environments of both fixed and mobile assets in real-time, and outdoor wireless mesh networks are proven to withstand even the harshest conditions. For example, if one node on equipment in a mining operation failed, other nodes would be able to both continue working and to triangulate its location, able to transmit and receive at the same time. The assets are connected to each other, so they don't have to have cell, internet, or other outside networks to work. Rajant has extensive experience in over twenty industries, as varied as military subcontracting, to their technology even being used by the NFL. We would also like to recognize them for donating equipment to St. Claire and other hospitals in our region to aid with mobile testing during the height of the COVID pandemic.





Enforcement Officer of the Year for Rowan County Award to Deputy Sheriff Mike Curtis. Deputy Curtis is a lifelong resident of Rowan County graduating from Rowan County High School in 1972. He began his law enforcement career in 1973 as a dispatcher for the Morehead Police Department. He served in that position for two years during school and also joined the Morehead Volunteer Fire Department in 1973 serving until 2000. Mike became a police officer in 1998 serving with the Morehead State University Police Department. Mike transferred to the Morehead Police Department in 2000 and retired from that position in 2018. During this period, from 2004-2006, he was selected to represent Morehead/Rowan County as a UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigation, Treatment and Education) Detective Supervisor. In 2019, he joined the Safe Schools program for the Rowan County School District serving as a School Resource Officer and sworn Rowan County Deputy Sheriff. He currently serves in that position primarily at the Tilden Hogge Elementary School. Safe Schools Coordinator Larry Robinson, advised that Mike not only does an exemplary job connecting with the kids but volunteers his time to attend after hours events to protect security for the attendees. Sheriff Matt Sparks said, "Deputy Curtis has served his community in an outstanding manner for decades and continues to protect and serve. George Hyatt, 93, member of American Legion Post 126, has been selected as the Grand Marshall of the 2023 Rowan County Memorial Day Parade.

George was drafted into the United States Army in 1951 at the beginning of the Korean War. George was from Rowan County and deployed to Korean in November. He was a member of the 987th Armored Infantry and he was a designed Wireman. His duties consisted of running wire and handling communications for the unit. George said that when he arrived at Incheon, there was heavy fighting that included hand to hand combat. George was awarded two Purple Hearts for being wounded in combat and two Bronze Stars for bravery. The first Purple Heart was received for leg wounds by shrapnel he received in an artillery attack. The second was Purple Heart and a Bronze Star were received when a mortar attack hit the motor pool. He put out a fire that endangered the unit but was burnt in the process. The other Bronze Star was for bravery in combat.He was in a fox hole and fighting was hand to hand. He saw a "potato masher", which was slang for that type of grenade, land in the hole. He grabbed the grenade and threw it out before it could explode, saving multiple lives.

George said the best memory he has of being in Korea was leaving and coming home. He did keep the clip from his rifle, with a few rounds, which he still has today. George returned to the United States and moved to Indiana for a job with Chrysler from which he retired. He returned to Rowan County in 1991 and has lived here since that time. George and many like him are the reason we have the freedoms we have in this country today. We take this time to honor him and his brothers. May God bless George Hyatt, his many brothers, and the United States of America.

History of Rowan County Jails Article by Cindy Leach

The first jail in Rowan County was located on Bishop Avenue and was built in 1857 and made of logs. It was financed by two Meyer brothers who lived on the Licking River near Farmers. This structure was inadequate for housing inmates, who often boasted about how easy it was to escape and had a tendency to catch fire. There is a story that the first woman prisoner set fire to the jail and burned it to the ground (Tennessee Eden). The wooden jail's deplorable conditions are recorded in Rowan County Fiscal Court minutes.

The Courthouse Square was donated to the newly formed county of Rowan in 1856 by Isabell Abbey Oxley, an ancestor of many current Rowan County residents. The square has been under the ownership of the Rowan County Fiscal Court since this time. The Courthouse, jail and school superintendent's office were all built on the square.

When the old courthouse was added to the National Historical Register in 1983, the jail and superintendent's office were not old enough to be included in the nomination. The requirement is for buildings to be 50 years old — the jail and superintendent's office were only 45 at the time. The buildings were successfully added to the Register in 2016 with the approval of a boundary increase to the old courthouse, which allowed the entire courthouse square to be protected by the designation.

The "current old" jail was built by the WPA (Works Progress Administration) under President Roosevelt's New Deal plan. The cost was \$75,000 and was believed to be "almost escape proof." Construction began on the old Rowan County Jail in 1937 and was completed and opened in January 1939. The building was constructed of rusticated limestone, which was supplied by the local quarry, located at Rockville, a small community near Farmers in Rowan County. A six-room residence was connected to the jail for the jailer and his family. That building has been razed.

The jail was condemned in 1942 and 1972 but used until 1991 when a new jail was built. After that, the Fiscal Court used it for storage. A new jail facility was planned soon after the jail condemnation. A 1.5 million city-county governmental complex was planned but was on hold still in 1974. The jail was to just be used as overnight stay but continued to hold prisoners. However, juvenile and female prisoners were taken to Bath County.

In 2016, Morehead State University requested that they be allowed to demolish the jail and the superintendent's building (now the Veteran's Museum) and were also requesting a permanent easement on the back side of the Courthouse Square. After public outcry over razing a historic building and a packed Fiscal Court meeting, the court voted unanimously to keep the old jail. The Rowan County Historical Task Force took on the job of restoration and was close to finishing when Covid-19 started. The Task Force is now trying to complete the process and hopes to turn it over soon to the Rowan County Arts Center to use as classrooms and artist studios.

Rowan County has had almost as many jails as courthouses! The next jail was built in 1989 next to the "new" courthouse on East Main Street, which was originally Parney Martindale's warehouse. It was built to hold 78 inmates but sometimes held as many as 140.

The fourth (and current) jail in Rowan County broke ground in 2016 on a new \$20.7 million detention center on July 18, about two years after the Kentucky Department of Corrections (DOC) authorized the county to move forward with the building project. The 300-bed jail was built on the former Eastern Kentucky Tobacco Warehouses.
