TOURISM SPURS ECONOMIC GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT IN OUR COMMUNITY

Morehead-Rowan County Tourism promotes every inch of this community, from east to west and from north to south. This has given us a unique opportunity for economic growth and development as we emerge from the pandemic, particularly within the area of outdoor tourism. Because of our location in the Daniel Boone National Forest and on the Sheltowee, we have access to over 100 miles of trails, with natural beauty and recreation opportunities for everyone to enjoy.

Annually, Morehead-Rowan County Tourism receives economic impact numbers from the State Department of Revenue. Tourist spending in Rowan County ended in 2020 at \$42.2 million, according to the state's formulas for calculating. That was great, despite a pandemic. We must consider spending that occurs as a result of tourism including but by no means limited to food, gasoline, fishing gear, hotels, cabins, kayak rentals, and more. In 2021, we grew tourist spending to \$51.2 million in Rowan County. This is a \$9 million increase! All of this goes to benefit our local economy, helping everyone who resides in, works in, or visits our community.

During a recent Morehead-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce luncheon, Joy Brown spoke about the importance of understanding the role tourism plays in the community. "We are the ambassadors of Morehead and Rowan County. Our job is to invite people to this community to visit, engage, spend, stay, eat, and repeat," Joy Brown said. "At least two of us travel January through February and sometimes into March to 3-4 states promoting this area. This doesn't include the musky fisherman that travel beyond the states we work travel shows, they host musky shows, musky road rules which is a musky school and more. On average, Morehead is promoted at travel shows 91 days a year by my team or a member of this community." Joy Brown, Executive Director of Morehead-Rowan County Tourism, has been working for tourism for 17 years as of the time of publishing. She leads a team of five full time team members, Paige Swartz, Jamie Breeze, Ashley Gilliam and Bob Patrick. At any given time, they also have five to six part- time employees. The team is responsible for the Morehead Conference Center, Rowan County Arts Center, and the Morehead Visitor Center.

Funding for our future is a success story, and we've obtained grants for these projects:

- Rowan County Cave Run Lake Facility Improvement \$200,000 Land and Water Conservation Fund grant for a project that is the first to partner the Rowan County Fiscal Court, United States Forest Service, United States Corps of Engineers, and Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Resources. Read more on page 3.
- Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvements \$240,000 grant for a project to implement the first phase "East Main Corridor" of the approved Morehead-Rowan County Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan that will connect East Main to Rodburn Hollow Park. - ARPA Funds for Tourism Grants new marketing dollars for \$100,326 worth of projects funds that Morehead-Rowan County Tourism's team had to present for approval prior to receiving these funds. Our community was the first in the state to receive ARPA funds and a visit from the Governor. Yes, before Lexington, Northern Kentucky and Louisville!

This demonstrates the power of partnerships and the lasting economic impact of tourism. Morehead-Rowan County Tourism is leading the way in demonstrating the importance of outdoor recreation in the tourism industry. We're being recognized not only in Eastern Kentucky but all across the state. Our tourism commission just launched a new website, visitmorehead.com, that shows all the great things waiting for you in our community. Rowan County Cave Run Lake Facility Improvement Project

In our community, Cave Run Lake is a beloved hallmark of the area as well as a significant recreational and tourism asset. It is important to us that everyone has an opportunity to enjoy what this has to offer for generations to come. That's why the Rowan County Fiscal Court, with the US Forestry Service, has applied for and received this Land and Water Conservation Fund grant.

Cave Run Lake is widely known for its excellent muskie fishing, trailheads such as the Sheltowee Trace National Recreational Trail, and more. Its thousands of acres of water surface is enjoyed by visitors year-round. It's a great piece of nature that has brought both joy and tangible benefits to our community.

The project will make improvements to several public outdoor recreational areas in Rowan County to provide new and enhanced opportunities that are accessible to youth, adults, senior citizens, and disabled persons. It's important to us that everyone can enjoy the lake and its trails, so these changes will improve handicap access and comply with the ADA.

As part of the facility changes, there will be a new Musky Bend fishing site, Relocation of Scott Creek Boat Ramp's Courtesy Dock, New Boat Dock at High Bank Picnic Area, and Ramey Creek Road Repairs and Pullout Reconstruction. Another essential part of this is securing the natural beauty of the environment for our future Rowan Countians. We're working with the U.S. Forestry Service on rehabilitation for the Boat Gunnel and Shallow Flats Trails. With sustainability in mind, we are doing our best to take care of the land and water we love.

We look forward to the long-term benefits this project will hold for Rowan County.

BLUE WATER TRAIL TO BRING TUBING, KAYAKING, AND MORE

Plans are underway to create a Bluewater Trail along the north fork of Tripplett Creek for kayaking, canoeing, and tubing. This project, headed by Tourism Director Joy Brown, will be a big win for having things to do in our own town, and it's a great weekend getaway idea for anyone who wants to visit. Not only does this trail create the opportunity to enjoy our area's waterways, but there are also so many opportunities to see abundant, diverse wildlife. There are four proposed access points: Bluestone Road, Cimmaron Road, KY 801, and Bullfork Road. There is still work to be done, but we're hoping to finish the project within the next year. This will be a great tourism opportunity as well as a good way to appreciate our county's natural beauty.



HISTORY OF CAVE RUN LAKE ARTICLE BY CINDY LEACH

In the early 1900's, Congress directed the US Corps of Engineers and other federal agencies to develop an extensive flood plain protection program to include the Ohio River, Mississippi River and other major rivers and their tributary streams. The Flood Control Act of 1936 continued to recognize flood control as a national priority. The 1939 Act authorized the US Army Corps of Engineers and other agencies to construct flood-control structures such as levees and floodwalls, and perform channel improvements. Among the flood control structures studied was the Cave Run Reservoir, but it was not until the devastating floods of 1935 and 1937 that congress authorized many of these structures but the Kentucky State Legislature opposed both of these projects and had them de-authorized. In 1965 a group of citizens from the four counties involved (Bath, Menifee, Morgan and Rowan) formed an association called the "Cave Run Reservoir Commission" to help get the dam and lake built. The design work had been in progress for a number of years and the initial dam site selected. This site was located just downstream on the Licking River from a site where the Cave Run and Little Cave Run creeks flow into the river. This site would eventually be the Twin Knobs area. Later the dam site was moved down stream to a location having higher abutments and narrower between the abutments. This site afforded substantial more dam height and storage capacity.

In February of 1968, under the "Battle Against Poverty" President Lyndon B. Johnson allocated 4 million in his budget for Cave Run Reservoir. His decision was based on nine factors: high unemployment in the area, the area was prone to major flooding, there were no factories or large buildings in the area, the land was all valley farms and farm houses, it was less than two miles to the C&O Railroad, this area had never received a sizable expenditure of any type, recreation was limited in this area, the dam will be within 10 miles of Morehead State University, the largest institution of higher learning in eastern Kentucky, and impoundments of water and favorable transportation should attract other businesses and factories to the area.

The project had the endorsement of former Governors A.B. Happy Chandler and Bert T. Combs, Congressman Carl D. Perkins, and Senators John Sherman Cooper and Thruston Morton. The preliminary and construction costs for the dam were estimated at \$13,780,000. However, after the relocations of 3 state highways, utilities and cemeteries with improved highways constructed all around the reservoir, the total cost was \$25,400,000.

The first public hearing was held in 1940 and there was considerable opposition to the project as it was necessary to relocate over 80 miles of roads and highways, cemeteries and utilities as well as homes and farms and many families would be displaced by the project. Other hearings were held in 1947 and 1957 and Congress gave final approval for the reservoir and the grand breaking took place on August 7, 1965. Much of the upland lands were under federal ownership with the US Forest Service and had acquired the land during the Great Depression but still quite a few lands under private ownership.

The land acquisition policy for Cave Run Lake was to acquire land 300 feet horizontally from the flood control pool elevation (765 feet above mean sea level. However, many small interior private holdings were acquired in the outer areas to prevent isolation. Between the period July 1966 and August 1976, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers purchased or acquired through condemnation, approximately 27,189 acres of land for the Cave Run Lake project. The lake project lies almost entirely within the proclamation boundary of the Daniel Boone National Forest. Under a Memorandum of Understanding between Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Forest Service, about 26,818 acres of land acquired by the Corps were transferred to the Forest Service for its management. The Forest Service also transferred about 44 acres to the Corps of Engineers for various purposes associated with the Cave Run Lake project.

45 miles of state and county roads, 67 miles of power lines, 29 miles of telephone lines and 275 families displaced, an abundance of lawsuits by the owners of the land, 28 old cemeteries were moved to New Alfrey Cemetery, and several communities such as Yale in Bath County, and Alfrey, Bangor, Cogswell, and Paragon in Rowan County.

Even with all the negative about building Cave Run Lake, it is good for the economy and ecology of Rowan, Bath, Morgan and Menifee Counties. The lake and recreation area opened in summer of 1974. Cave Run Lake provides flood protection to the lower Licking River valley and has prevented over \$270.85 million dollars in cumulative flood damages through FY 2016. The lake also supplies water to the area's communities, improves the Licking River's water flow conditions, and offers a habitat for various species of fish and wildlife. More than 300 species of birds, mammals, amphibians, and reptiles can be found in the hardwood-covered hills, hills, forest openings, streams, ponds and caves of Cave Run Lake. The Minor E. Clark Fish Hatchery produces between three and four million fingerlings annually, which are released into Kentucky's lakes, rivers and suitable streams.

The lake offers boating, fishing, swimming, and other recreational activities to the general public. The project averages 257 thousand visitors annually, contributing millions of dollars to the local economy every year.



We are in the process of finishing up our annual inspection.

Our fleets are in good shape.

We've had some difficulties in maintaining the cost of stretchers due to price hikes but we are working on solutions.

We're working with dispatch to make arrangements for emergency response for once we get the secondary ambulance service up and running.

We've issued 88 electric permits this year. We've cleaned 22 dump sites.

We plan to hold a free dump day in June. We are applying for a grant to hopefully hold a Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Day later this summer. Read about our free waste tire disposal event in the highlight below.

The program will be held on: Thursday, June 1st, from 8am-3:30pm; Friday, June 2nd, from 8am-3:30pm; Saturday, June 3rd, from 8am-12pm. Program participants must deliver their waste tires behind the County ServicesBuilding located next to the Corbie EllingtonPost 126 of the American Legion, on 200 American Legion Way in Morehead.

TIRES ACCEPTED: Passenger Tires - Light Truck Tires- Truck Tires- Agricultural Tires- Lawn Tractor - ATV-Bicycle Tires -Tires on Rims.

TIRES NOT ACCEPTED: Foam/Calcium Filled Tires - Heavy Equipment (OTR) - Solid tires with or without pressed on rims -Any Tire with a Bead Greater Than 1 %".

Tire retailers, Scrap Yards and Recycle businesses are expressly prohibited from participating. After this event, waste tires found in Rowan County will be targeted for enforcement action. These actions may result in the owner of the tires and/or property being subject to financial penalties and cleanup cost. Raven Cares Facility Celebrates Grand Opening

Raven Cares, a new post-treatment residential facility providing second chances, celebrated its grand opening on East Main Street. Several speakers including Governor Andy Beshear attended and participated in a ribbon cutting. Raven Cares was developed in memory of Cassie Monét Chaney and her fascination with the raven, which symbolizes change or transformation. Chaney battled addiction and was a champion of recovery as she supported others around the Morehead area, until she passed away in 2021. Raven Cares offers a safe haven to those recovering from addiction with services aiding in transition into long-term recovery. Teaming with a variety of community partnerships, Raven Cares can offer its residents second-chance employment through job-seeking skills, access to higher education and financial literacy to give clients tools to be productive and sober. Case Manager Audrey Holbrook outlined the various community partnerships such as Kentucky Career Center, MSU, MCTC, and Edward Jones. The Raven Cares facility's outpatient services provide recovery support and resources including transitional housing, mental healthcare, career services, education, as well as soft skills including getting a driver's license, setting up a bank account and more. Beshear presented Raven Cares with \$500,000 at the grand opening provided by the Appalachian Regional Commission's Inspire Initiative. "We're helping people start their lives over. We're helping them find light, hope and love," Ashley Adkins said.

"Look at how far we've come to ending the stigma of addiction, to encouraging treatment, when we shut down the street in Morehead to celebrate what Raven Cares is doing," said Beshear. "As we sit here today and cut this ribbon, we are taking another step forward in our state and our people's battle against addiction."



Governor Beshear's Senior Adviser Rocky Adkins, who served in the state House of Representatives for 32 years, said he was proud to see the Morehead community embrace Raven Cares and support those in its community who suffer from addiction. "Folks, I am honored to be a part of this community and Morehead," said Adkins. "This community as you know is an unbelievable community that reaches out to help people every day, caring for people with a big heart. Today is a prime example of what this community is all about." Domestic Violence Emergency Services of Gateway



Domestic Violence Emergency Services, (DOVES) has provided direct services to survivors of interpersonal violence in the Gateway Area Development District for over 30 years. Established in 1989, we are a state accredited; nonprofit located in Morehead, KY. Our service area encompasses the rural counties of Bath, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, and Rowan. Components of our program services include crisis intervention, emergency shelter, transitional services, and outreach/non-residential services.

DOVES mission is to provide safe shelter and advocate for survivors of interpersonal violence. DOVES staff provide direct services to both residential and non-residential victims of domestic violence. We provide a 24/7 crisis hotline, individual and group counseling, legal advocacy, medical advocacy, individual case plans, referrals and assistance in obtaining community resources, housing assistance, transportation, educational advocacy, and budgeting and household management skills. We are the designated agency to assist victims in filing after hour emergency protective orders in Rowan and Bath Counties.

DOVES realizes that an individual responds to and heals from traumatic events in their own way. Our qualified staff have received certification through Zero V: Kentucky United Against Violence (formally KCADV) and are trained to provide empathetic listening, support, and information that allows individuals to take control of their lives.

Often survivors are dealing with substance abuse issues, mental illness, medical needs, unemployment, lack of education, or chronic homelessness in addition to trying to rebuild their life after escaping an abusive relationship. Throughout the years, as our knowledge base increases regarding survivor needs, DOVES has been dedicated to expanding on services and developing community partnerships to increase our ability to meet needs of survivors. Seasoned advocates are able to react quickly during crisis situations and provide crucial services to address the ongoing needs of survivors.

DOVES strives to end interpersonal violence, and until that time comes, we are here for every survivor that needs support, empowerment, and advocacy during their journey of healing. 
