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### **Ground Broken for Secondary Ambulance Service Building**

We broke ground on our new secondary ambulance service facility, the John "Pete" B. Hamm Station.

The site will serve as a hub for emergency medical services in the eastern half of the county and dramatically cut response times for our people in need. Rowan County EMS makes over 5,000 runs yearly and serves a regional medical facility. To respond to the needs of our growing county, it is essential that we grow our services. This will help set us up for the future, with an impact felt by Rowan Countians long after we've all moved on.

The station's name honors Pete Hamm, a Rowan County native who spent his lifetime serving his country, community, and others. After serving 20 years in the Air Force, he returned home to Morehead with his family and dedicated himself to our community. From 1972 to 1992, Pete grew our ambulance service from a bare-bones operation with only one vehicle, to a thriving operation with five ambulances, over twenty-five employees, and the first paramedics on staff. The service was self-sufficient and recognized as one of the best in the state, and it is thanks to the continual efforts of our staff, from then to now, that helped us get to where we are today.

We want to thank our friends at the Gateway Area Development District, Department of Local Government, our Legislators, the Governor and his Cabinet, and all those who came before to make Rowan County EMS one of the most efficient and resolute services in Eastern Kentucky.





## Pete Hamm and the History of the Rowan County Ambulance Service

John B. Pete Hamm, a native of Rowan County has spent his lifetime serving his country, serving his community and serving others. Pete spent twenty years in the Air Force. He served during the occupation of Germany, the Korean War, and Vietnam. He retired from the military in October of 1971 and returned home to Morehead with his wife, Mary Louise Koski, and three children, John, Rob, and Mary Beth. Upon his return to Morehead, Pete was involved in the development of the Morehead City Park. Pete also served veterans and their families for decades in a variety of roles such as Service Officer, Chaplin, and as a member of the American Legion Honor Guard. He was a charter member of the Veteran's Association and was involved in the planning, fund raising, research, and building of Freedom Park and the memorial wall. Pete also served as a School Board member for twelve years from 1981 to 1992. Currently, Pete is an active member of the Morehead Optimist Club and the Clearfield Tabernacle Church of God. Although it is obvious that Pete loves his hometown, the people, and the community, today we want to focus on Pete's influence and impact on the Morehead Rowan Ambulance Service where he worked a second career from the service's beginning in July of 1972 until he retired in 1992.



In 1972, Pete was assigned as the director of the newly established Morehead Rowan Ambulance Service. In the beginning it was a bare bones operation with only one ambulance and only in-county service. Pete was tasked with the challenge of hiring employees, setting schedules, growing the business, following state and federal regulations, all while operating on a shoestring budget. The first employees had Red Cross training, but EMT training soon followed. In the early years, Pete served not only as the director but also as a backup ambulance driver if the need arose.

Through solid leadership, creativity, and community support, the service grew from a one vehicle operation that was housed at City Hall to a three vehicle in and out of county operation by 1978. It was at this time when the service moved to a new location on Old Flemingsburg Road. Pete continued to expand the service during his tenure. To improve patient care, he recruited employees to attend Paramedics school and the ambulance service paid for the training. In return, the recruits committed to remain at the service for two years upon graduation. At the time of his retirement in June of 1992, the service had five ambulances and over twenty-five employees and the first paramedics on staff. The service was self-sufficient and was recognized as one of the best ambulance services in the state. Pete's insight, dedication, and leadership, along with a quality, dedicated staff began the process that allows us to be here celebrating today.

In honor of Pete and as a small thanks for his dedication to Rowan County, we are going to dedicate the new ambulance station as the John Pete B. Hamm Station.

## GADD LAUNCHES MOTORMEALS – SENIOR MEALS ON THE MOVE

After serving over 600 seniors and providing approximately 78,300 meals via its **congregate** and home delivered meal programs in 2022, Gateway Area Development District (GADD) is launching a new mobile **meal distribution** site program, MotorMeals.

GADD, who operates the senior centers in Bath, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, and Rowan Counties, is ringing in the new year with a new program that will canvas the region targeting populated areas, communities, and housing developments to provide seniors with a hot nutritionally-qualified meal.

The MotorMeals food truck will be set up at various locations within the region Monday through Friday each week from 11:00 AM to 12:00 PM, excluding holidays and inclement weather days. The program is already underway, and a complete schedule can be obtained by contacting your local senior center, visiting www.gwadd.org, or by following GADD on its Facebook and Twitter social media platforms.

The MotorMeals program, made possible by financial assistance from the Kentucky Department for Aging and Independent Living (DAIL), via Expanded Senior Meal Program (ESMP) funding authorized by Governor Andy Beshear and the Kentucky General Assembly, will serve those 60 years of age and older across GADD's five-county service region. Services provided through the MotorMeals program will include meal and nutrition services, information and assistance, and outreach resources.

Mr. Joshua Farrow, GADD's Executive Director, stated, "GADD's MotorMeals program has been established to take our senior center-related services on the road to non-county-seat cities, populated communities, and housing complexes within the region. Our goal is to provide a hot meal to seniors, while also spreading the word about no-cost services that are provided by GADD to those 60 years of age and older."

To participate in the program, individuals must be enrolled, or enroll, in a GADD senior center program. Signing up is quick and easy, and can be completed over the phone by contacting your local senior center. Individuals will be limited to one (I) meal per person each serving day, and meals will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis; individuals must be present to receive a meal. The meals are provided at no cost; however, a \$1.00 donation is suggested.



## Rowan County Soil Conservation District

The mission statement of the Conservation District is "To conserve and promote the best use of the natural resources of the county by encouraging the use of Best Management Practices, district involvement with land use policy decisions, public awareness and education."

The Rowan County Soil Conservation District fulfills this mission statement by administering several programs for the farmers and citizens of Rowan County. Programs such as the annual tree giveaway, equipment renting, dead animal removal grant, annual art and writing contest for the Rowan County School System, as well as administering the Kentucky County Agricultural Investment Program (CAIP) and Kentucky State Cost Share Program.

Kentucky's Conservation Districts are a subdivision of state government created through the passing of KRS Chapter 292 by the Kentucky General Assembly in 1940. In the years following this legislation being passed each Kentucky county organized its own Soil Conservation District. Rowan County's Soil Conservation District was founded in 1942.

The Rowan County Soil Conservation District also partners with the Natural Resources Conservation Service to help administer federal cost share programs to the farmers and producers here in Rowan County. ## Community Histories: Ramey and Bluebank By Cindy Leach

#### Ramey

The Ramey post office was established by John Ramey on October 1, 1901, a quarter mile up Three Lick. Then it closed, it was located 1 ½ miles up Bluebank Road just North of I-64 and 2 miles southeast of original location. The population served was 500.

The post office was moved 7½ miles west on July 31, 1908. It was moved again 13/8 miles northeast on November 18, 1909. Postmasters-John Ramey- September 10, 1901, William Prater -December 29, 1903, Clara Prater -March 11, 1907, Hattie A Harrett - July 31, 1908, Charles Clay - November 18, 1909 – resigned May 13, 1932 The Post Office was discontinued June 22, 1932 and the mail sent to Farmers.

Several Ramey families were listed in the census records such as John Ramey who opened a store in the Farmers area in 1902, and Alvin Ramey and wife Rachel lived with James Brain and his family. At least two Ramey's were relocated after burial to the New Alfrey Cemetery for the construction of Cave Run Lake -J.A. Ramey (1848-1935) who was buried in the McKenzie Cemetery and Richard Ramey (1860-1939) who was buried in the Ramey Cemetery.

#### Bluebank/Blue Banke

The Post Office at Blue Banke was established on July 31, 1871 by John W. Morgan. It was discontinued on January 28, 1874 and re-established as Bluebank on November 1, 1901. The order was rescinded again on December 6, 1901. Bluebank was a village of about 50 people.
